

Dear Members & Friends of SCGDB

Building on an impressive past

I take over from **Dr. Amy Merrill**, who for over the last 4 years of leadership, first as Vice President, then as President has led the Society with a steady and clear focus. Under her leadership, we have grown in new dimensions in patient advocacy and support of broader craniofacial research community. But under-the-hood, the changes and structure formulated in the operations of the Society and its affiliations driven by her leadership have set the stage for a solid future for the Society. Of note is negotiating a renewed association agreement with the American Association for Anatomy, which through shared interest in education and research will continue to promote the mission of both groups for at least the next 5 years. The health of the Society today is also directly due to the efforts of past officials, **Drs. Jean-Pierre Saint-Jeannet** and **Juhee Jeong** (both from New York University College of Dentistry), **Dr. Katherine Fantauzzo** (from University of Colorado Anschutz Medical Campus) as well as continued assistance from **Drs. Rolf Stottman** (Nationwide Children's Hospital, Ohio) and **Sam Bruggman** (Cincinnati Children's Hospital). But a special call-out to **Dr. David Clothier** (University of Colorado Anschutz Medical Campus) needs to be made. David served as President prior to Amy and stayed on as President *ex-officio* and under whose level-headed guidance and participation, the Society has emerged in a refined position to be able to meet future opportunities. David has shouldered the Society with firm determination of its future – his guidance will be missed, but his efforts remain.

Welcoming new leadership

I take the lead from an impressive team, but I am pleased that Amy is staying on as *ex-officio* President to help transition the next two years. Our secretary, Katie Fantauzzo is also continuing, providing her unwavering guidance and organization, for which I am <u>overwhelmingly thankful</u>. In addition, Juhee Jeong continues to provide leadership assistance with financial health of the Society and our investments in the future. <u>The leadership of the Society is growing -</u> in the last Annual meeting of the Society in Kansas City a new Vice President **Dr. Lisa Taneyhill** from the University of Maryland and treasurer, **Dr. Eric Van Otterloo** (University of Iowa), were elected to lead the society. Lisa is an international leader in study of neural crest specification and has been a long-standing leader in the craniofacial and anatomy community. Lisa Tannehill is chairing a Society symposium at the **Annual American Association of Anatomists meeting in March 2025**, which is the cornerstone to our continued efforts in education, community integration and growth. Eric has been an active



member of the Society and brings his expertise in cell signaling and disease modeling of craniofacial disorders to the team. His expertise and unwavering support of the SCGDB community has been invaluable in the past and even more so now.

I quote words of Dr. Merrill in her previous SCGDB letter here in that '<u>the SCGDB is only as strong as its</u> <u>members'</u>.
